History

Beaver Island State Park's 950 acres lies in the southernmost tip of Grand Island, NY. It consists mostly of mixed deciduous forest, open fields, wetlands, and the Beaver Island Lagoon. Because of the diversity of the trees, shrubs, and other vegetation, the park is inhabited by a wide variety of wildlife species.

With the loss of so many native trees, this balance is at risk.



Why are we losing Trees?

- Stress from insect infestations and disease
- Extreme weather conditions including drought and heavy rainfall seasons
- Natural disasters such as lightning and high sustained winds
- Severe winter storms (ie. 2006 October Storm, winter of 2013 -2014) have brought damaging heavy snow and ice and deep freeze
