## Reports

# **Deputy Commissioner Daniel Mackay**

Deputy Commissioner Mackay acknowledged Commissioner Harvey, who could not attend the meeting, and noted that he was reporting on her behalf. He told the board members that visiting the twenty nominations they were reviewing today would require a sixty-hour road trip of 2,700 miles, noting the remarkable geographic diversity of the group. He also noted the properties' equally remarkable diversity of architecture and significance and thanked staff for the extra effort that had been put into preparation, both writing nominations themselves and assisting consultants.

Next, he lauded Michael Lynch's significant effort to prepare an annual report, which the deputy commissioner passed out to members. He noted that we have a very hard working staff, that the pace never relents, and that we are doing nationally significant work here. He then reported on the trip that he, Michael, and Dan McEneny made to Washington to meet with our congressional delegation. He was very pleased to announce that they met with 25 of 27 congressional offices and had a terrific meeting with a joint senate committee. They discussed important tax credit and National Register projects while asking for sustained historic preservation funding.

In more tax credit news, both houses of the state legislature have included early reauthorization and proposed "fixes" for transition rules in census tracks in their budget bills. Finally, Daniel reported that we had received an NPS grant to document twentieth-century civil rights sites in upstate New York from the NPS. He credited Kathleen LaFrank and Kathy Howe for pursuing this very competitive grant; Kath LaFrank in turn acknowledged board member Jennifer Lamak and colleague Cordell Reaves for their assistance.

Returning to tax credits once more, Daniel reported that since 1992, we had seen \$6.6 billion in investment due to federal tax credits, that \$4.7 billion was pending, and that we had 458 part 1 applications. With \$1.2 last year New York was #1 in the nation for the third year in a row and with this volume, we expected to continue in that position for the next few years.

Wint Aldrich asked whether this administration was especially sensitive to property rights, and Kath LaFrank replied that we not receiving large numbers of objections, as we had for some districts in the past. In the Mohawk Valley, in particular, we have done about four districts recently with little or no objections and several more were in the works. She did tell the members that the NPS was becoming more particular about what was contributing and what was not, noting that nothing was assured to be contributing until NPS had ruled on it – this usually as part of a tax credit application. She added that staff increasingly had to provide extra justification for things that they had judged to be non-controversial.

Wint also put in a request for updated staff territory maps, which was promised with the minutes.

Kathy Howe introduced our new survey unit staff member, Erin Czernecki, who came to us from Crailo, to the board. Erin was a very welcome addition to the staff!

## Doug Perrelli

Kath LaFrank had allotted time for Doug Perrelli to discuss the chart he prepares to assist him in reviewing nominations, as well as for all the members to ask us any questions about the NR form or the process. NR staff had met previously and brought some materials to share.

Doug explained how he organizes the properties on a chart and what are the things he looks for in a nominations. They are: the level of significance, expecting state or nationally significant properties to meet a higher bar; the dates of significance and the number of years spanned; he looks at whether a property represents a few years or a span of centuries. He explained that one of his pet peeves was the number of contributing and non-contributing resources: he felt that the number of non-contributing resources was often too high and that he would like to see their locations on a map to determine if the district held up. This provoked some discussion, as Kath LaFrank explained that the nomination form does not differentiate between primary non-contributing buildings or outbuildings, such as garages and sheds. She noted that there was a significant difference between a 600 building district with 100 *primary* nc buildings and a 600 building district with 100 *secondary* nc buildings and that she hoped that everyone understood this nuance. She pointed out that it is usually explained in the text and indicated on a very carefully coded map; however, the maps were not usually ready in time for the board

meetings. Staff brought examples of maps to show and members were impressed. We would have to see if they could be produced earlier without inconveniencing our GIS team. Our goal is always to make what we send out more helpful.

Kath took the discussion a little farther, asking members to consider not just buildings but also areas of significance, which indicate what kinds of buildings and features to expect. Doug also asked if we ever group individually listed buildings into districts and Kath explained how this is often done in places where the most obviously eligible resources were listed first.

Kristin Herron asked if the sheet could be done in excel and if the nominations could be grouped differently for presentation; say, by theme. Kath answered that there were many different ways to arrange the presentations; however, staff greatly preferred doing all of their presentations together. She noted that she might change for a special occasion; however, otherwise, she preferred to give the staff their preference since they are the ones doing the hard work.

Kristin Herron also asked why some of the nominations were arranged differently. In response, Kath explained the different components of a nomination and how the parts should fit together. She emphasized that the first paragraph of item 8 was the most critical in the entire nomination and said that if the information was presented well there, we were more lenient about the way the rest of it was presented. She noted that not many were fond of the current NPS template. The more problematic ones were those where the writer insisted on trying to "tell a story" rather than presenting the needed analysis.

Board members seemed pleased with this discussion, which Kath told them could be continued at any time in the future.

#### Louise Slaughter

Before the board moved on to National Register reviews, Daniel Mackay delivered the sad news that Rochester Congresswoman Louise Slaughter, who served 32 years in congress, had just died following a fall/concussion earlier in the week.
