Dive further into the histories of the people of Clermont with our Visitor Center exhibit, "Spero Meliora: Life in The Land of Livingston." Two special exhibits are on view this season, "Redefining The Family: The Livingstons and the Institution of Slavery" and "The Matriarch of

Those Who Served: The Enslaved and Paid Servants of Clermont Sunday, March 16, 2025

2pm

Mansion-Meets at the Visitor Center

\$10 for adults, \$8 for seniors and students, and children under 12 are free.

Over the course of more than 200 years, hundreds of people worked at

Clermont to keep the Livingston family comfortable. For nearly a century, the mansion was run by a mostly enslaved staff. By the 1830s, this staff was completely replaced by paid labor.

Though many of their stories were lost, recent research has revealed new details about those who worked for the Livingston family. From Old Cole, a black man enslaved by Chancellor Livingston, to Shige Toshio, a Japanese immigrant who served as the Livingston's butler, to Ollie and Christopher Meyer, two young people from different continents who found love in Clermont's kitchen, join us as we uncover some of the stories of those who served. The tour also delves into the realities of enslavement, immigration, and employment across three centuries.

Alice as Artist Sunday, March 23, 2025 2pm Visitor Center, Free!

In 1928, Alice D.C. Livingston submitted a smattering of sculptures to the

Pennsylvania Academy of Fine Arts' annual exhibition. Included was an enigmatic bronze depicting a draped female figure, hands held aloft in exaltation or prayer. Recent research has uncovered a review featuring this bronze figure in a 1928 edition of *Revue du Vrai et du Beau*. Although relatively short, this is the only published piece we have been able to find on Alice's work and her exhibition history as an artist.

In celebration of women's history month, join us for a presentation featuring this newly unearthed primary source as well as a broader discussion on the art Alice produced as a self-taught sculptor.

Gilded Age Scandals!

"Gilded Age Scandals" focuses a spotlight on the scandalous behavior of the very rich at the turn of the century. Staatsburgh's owners, Ruth and Ogden Mills, were models of respectability, but the transgressions of their friends shocked Edwardian Society. We'll discuss celebrity murders, heiresses for sale,

and scandals that reached as high as the King of England and the President of the United States. Stories of misbehavior feature a monkey in the formal dining room, arsenic in the clam chowder, and the tale of the famous Society figure who told his distraught bride on their wedding night, "Your money is your only asset in my eyes."



Meet at the front (upper level/south side) of the Joseph Caputo Center, which is located at 95 Broadway, Ossining, NY 10562, just west of Rte. 9/Highland Ave. at the junction of Croton Ave. (Rte. 133 (from Metro-North Ossining Train Station by taxi or 15-minute uphill walk/parking lots nearby). After a brief walk, descend into the Weir in Ossining and explore the original 1842 brick water tunnel and learn its history. Walk may be rescheduled if weather does not cooperate.

March 9, Sunday at 1 pm – Croton Dam Hike. Enjoy a free, easy, 2 miles/2 hours (total) loop hike north along the Aqueduct and atop the beautiful Croton Dam. Meet near the restrooms at the rear (south end) of the parking lot at Croton Gorge Park, Rte. 129, Cortlandt, NY. 10567, GPS Coordinates: 41°13′ 20.46″ N -73°51′12.59″ W. The leader of the hike will discuss the history and construction of the Old Croton Aqueduct and the features of the Croton Dam, the trailhead of the Old Croton Aqueduct Trail. The Aqueduct was completed in

1842 to supply fresh water to a thirsty New York City. (From Metro-North Hudson Line Croton-Harmon Train Station: 15-minute taxi.) Walk may be rescheduled if weather does not cooperate. Required: preregistration: https://aqueduct.org/event/?id=281

Rockefeller is a designated State Park Preserve. A Park Preserve is a protected area of importance for flora, fauna, or features of geological or other special interest, which is reserved and managed for conservation purposes. We are recognized as an Important Bird Area by the National Audubon Society and have a diverse population of animal residents. We are also part of the Old Growth Forest Network and are home to a number of rare and protected plants. We welcome passive recreation such as walking, jogging, photography or wildlife viewing but please leave the picnic and park games at home. Thank you!

Old Growth Forest Hike March 8 from 9 am – 12 pm

In April of 2022, the forest along Big Tree trail was inducted into the Old Growth Forest Network, demonstrating our commitment to protecting this area in perpetuity so that it will someday become a true old growth forest. Relatively undisturbed by human activity for 150 years, this area contains some of the Preserve's oldest and tallest trees. Join Mike for a 6-mile hike to Big Tree trail, and along the way explore some of the Preserve's most treasured landscapes and features, including the 13 Bridges trail, the Pocantico River, and the Triple-

Arch Bridge. We'll emerge from this forested landscape and complete the hike with a view of Swan Lake. Leashed dogs are welcome. Be prepared to move at a steady pace; some hiking experience is recommended. Max: 20 people. Cost: FREE, registration required. Parking: \$6 per vehicle.




Sensory Hike: Rise and Shine! March 28 from 9 – 10:30 am

Featured Trail of the Month



Clermont State Historic Site: Riverside Trail

1 Clermont Avenue, (GPS use 416 Woods Rd)

Germantown, NY 12526

Trail Map: ClermontTrailMap.pdf

Distance: 0.85 mile stretch

Difficulty Rating: Easy

Clermont State Historic Site is located along the east side of the Hudson River. This property once belonged to the wealthy Livingston family, whose mansion, gardens, and other structures remain – some still intact while others in ruin. This park has plenty to offer! Aside from its long history, it is home to over 7 miles of trail. The Riverside Trail, blazed white, begins at the site's parking lot, and continues along a gentle sloping field providing a stunning view of the Catskill Mountains over the Hudson River. This trail is

just under a mile out and back but is often walked in a loop with the Chancellor's Trail (see park map). The Riverside Trail at Clermont is a calm walk with great views making it perfect for a peaceful winter stroll or cross-country ski through the woods.
